

## Traveling to Miami? New Airport Connector Provides Direct Route from Terminal to Downtown

Launching July 28<sup>th</sup>, Metromover extension will connect Miami's airport to its urban core

MIAMI – On Saturday July 28, Miami-Dade Transit Authority will officially open its newest Metrorail station at the Miami International Airport, providing a direct route for passengers going from the airport to the city's center in downtown.

"Miami can now boast one of the most robust public transportation systems in the Southeast and join the ranks of some of the world's greatest cities, all of which have direct connections between their airports and urban cores," said Alyce Robertson, Executive Director of the Miami Downtown Development Authority.

The new Metrorail airport link will join a suite of public transportation options available in downtown Miami, including the above-ground Metromover, Downtown Trolley, Monkey Shuttle, water taxis and bike share programs.

"Miami is emerging as a magnet for foreign investment and urban living," said Marc Sarnoff, City of Miami District 2 Commissioner and Chairman of the Miami DDA. "More transportation options mean increased accessibility, enhanced quality of life, and greater connectivity – all critical ingredients to solidifying our status on a global scale."

The 2.4 mile Metrorail "Orange Line" extension to Miami International Airport was funded by the Florida Department of Transportation and the People's Transportation Plan (PTP) – a half penny sales surtax approved by Miami-Dade voters in 2002. The new line, which took nearly three years to complete, will take passengers to all stations between Dadeland South and Earlington Heights, continuing west towards the new MIA Station.

According to the Miami-Dade Transit Authority, the average travel time from the downtown Miami station to the airport terminal will be approximately 15 to 20 minutes. It is estimated that an additional 9,000 people will access the MIA Metrorail station each day. Cost to ride is two dollars per person each way.

Miami-Dade Transit, together with the Miami Downtown Development Authority and the Greater Miami Convention & Visitors Bureau, will celebrate the launch of the Metrorail Orange Line on Saturday July 28 between 1 p.m. and 4 p.m. at the Stephen P. Clark Government Center Plaza Station at 111 NW 1<sup>st</sup> Street in downtown Miami. Festivities will include free food, souvenir photos, and live music.
